

## Information About Jim Glanville

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Jim Glanville was born in 1941 in London, England, graduated from the Royal College of Science in 1962 with a B.Sc. degree in chemistry, and emigrated to the US. He obtained a Ph.D. degree in chemistry from the University of Maryland in 1967. After brief employment with FMC Corporation in New Jersey, he moved to Roanoke, Virginia, in 1969 and was successively Professor of Chemistry at Virginia Western Community College and Vice-president of Research and Development at Wen-Don Chemical Corporation. He became Director of General Chemistry at Virginia Tech in Blacksburg in 1986 and retired from Virginia Tech in February, 2004. Subsequently, he has made an encore career as an independent scholar of history and archeology. He became an American citizen on 4 July 1972 in Roanoke and is married to Deena Flinchum, a Wytheville, Virginia, native. He is the author of 35 professional chemical publications, five patents, and a chemistry text book (*General Chemistry for Engineers*, Pearson Education, 2001, 2003, and 2004).
